What's happened so far?

- The Government acknowledges that the SEND system doesn't currently work well and support varies too much.
- SEND review and Schools White Paper published in March this year.
- Bold ambitions...“ensure that every child and young person has their needs identified quickly and met more consistently, with support determined by their needs, not by where they live.”
- Nothing set in stone - still time to influence the review
- Expect a delivery plan this Autumn

What is the Government suggesting?

- Setting nationally consistent standards for SEND and alternative provision.
- Digitised EHCP process and template.
- Mandatory mediation.
- A national framework of banding and price tariffs for high needs funding. (EHCP Plan funding).
- Ofsted inspections focus on experiences of children and young people with SEND.

What does this mean for you and your child?



Areas for cautious optimism

- National standards – will include “best practice in reasonable adjustments for disabled children.” Could mean teachers get the basics right for deaf children
- Improving careers guidance for young people with SEND
- Strengthening the checks when a child is aged 2. We’d like involvement from Teachers of the Deaf in these checks

What does this mean for you and your child?



Areas where we would like the Department to do more

- There was little in the review about Teachers of the Deaf and the role of specialist education services for deaf children. A missed opportunity not to reverse the decline
- Making sure that teacher training covers SEND. Deaf young people have told us that classroom teachers need better deaf awareness and we think that initial and ongoing teacher training needs to be strengthened.

What does this mean for you and your child?



Areas of concern, where we need to see the detail

- The Department has suggested setting up new local SEND partnerships to create inclusion plans for each area including a list of approved local schools (special and mainstream).
- Given the low number of deaf children will these plans account of their needs?
- Will this be used to limit parental choice?
- Mandatory mediation

Focus on... national standards



- Aim to give more consistency in the “provision, processes and systems” for children and young people with SEND.
- Apply across education, health and care – from age 0-25.
- The only deaf specific legal requirements now are:
 - 1) that qualified Teachers of the Deaf should be consulted when undertaking a statutory assessment for an Education, Health and Care plans for a deaf child
 - 2) that teachers of classes of deaf children should hold an additional teaching qualification in deafness.

What should they include?



We want to see national standards which are:

- Deaf-specific.
- Allow some flexibility for children's individual needs.
- They should enable the right support for deaf children.

For us to support the standards, they must not:

- Narrow existing legal rights and limit parents' rights to appeal.
- Lead to any reduction in existing support or a 'race to the bottom'.
