Why we're here

Tilly is mum to Ada (4) who's profoundly deaf.

"When we found out at six weeks old that Ada was moderately deaf it felt like a huge blow. We had no experience of hearing loss and we were acutely aware of how little we knew.

When Ada was 20 months old, her deafness dramatically progressed. I was devastated and went through a grieving process. Ada had only a basic way of communicating through gesture and it led to huge frustration and tantrums. We didn't know how to help her.

Angie from the National Deaf Children's Society was incredible and helped me fill in the complicated forms to apply for Disability Living Allowance. With her help we were also able to secure a British Sign Language interpreter for Ada throughout her early years education.

This wonderful charity is a safety net. Without them, my confidence and resolve wouldn't be where it is now. The past four years have taught me that Ada's deafness isn't a negative thing. Signing is part of who she is, it's a joy to see. We're so proud of her."



Getting started

1 Decide what to do

2 Choose a date

Make sure you give yourself plenty of time to get organised.



3 Set a fundraising target

It'll help you stay on track and make family and friends feel like they're contributing towards a goal.



4 Create a fundraising page

It's easy to fundraise online. Funds are transferred to us securely so you don't need to worry about collecting sponsorship after the event. Set up your page at justgiving.com/ndcs.



5 Tell the world

You're doing something amazing, so make sure you shout about it on social media and contact the local press.

Lucy raised £1,600 by dancing every day for the entire run of Strictly Come Dancing.

"I've always loved dancing and when I found out Rose Ayling-Ellis was appearing on Strictly, the idea formed of dancing for 30 minutes for every day of its run. By the end of the challenge, I'd danced for more than 42 hours!

I was born profoundly deaf and it felt like a fitting way to give back to the National Deaf Children's Society. The charity believes in deaf children having opportunities just like every other child. My mum and dad were determined to give me those opportunities, and the charity supported them in doing that. This was my way of saying thank you.

I set up a JustGiving page and I was blown away by the generosity from friends, family and colleagues. Their support meant I exceeded my fundraising target of £300 in just one week. In the end I smashed that target, raising more than £1,600. It motivated me to keep dancing all the way to the final."



Fundraising ideas

If you're not sure how you want to fundraise, here are some suggestions to inspire you.





Bake a difference

Our Big Cake Bake is perfect for home, school or your workplace - and can be as big or small as you like. Get in touch with the Community Fundraising team to order your Big Cake Bake pack, complete with poster, stickers and cake topper, or order one from our website.

2 Get quizzical

Pub quiz regulars and trivia first timers can all take part in our ready-made quiz at ndcs.org.uk/quizzical. You could hold it virtually or in-person. Approach local businesses for prizes and charge an entry fee per team.

Dress up loud at school

Help raise funds and deaf awareness in your school by dressing up in loud and bright clothes for the day. Charge everyone £1 to dress up loud. For added fun why not hold a fashion show or a competition for the most outrageous outfit?



Hold a bucket collection at your local supermarket, train station or shopping centre. Stand out from the crowd by collecting in fancy dress or themed outfits. Make sure you speak to the relevant authorities for permission.


5 Fundraise in the office

Try a bake sale, office Olympics or dress down day - or take breakfast orders and set up your own tea trolley. If your employer would like to get involved, ask them to match-fund your efforts, offer a raffle prize, or auction off a day's holiday to the highest bidder.

Up the stakes

Sweepstakes are one of the easiest fundraisers around. Simply choose your event (sporting competitions, Eurovision, Bake Off - the list is endless) and encourage friends, family and colleagues to pick a team or contestant out of a hat in exchange for a donation.

Make your fundraising go further

Share your story

Are you fundraising for a special person? Do you want to give something back to our charity? Your supporters will want to know the reason behind your challenge.

2 Use photos

Share inspiring and motivating images on your fundraising page or on social media. They will spark people's emotions and may encourage them to donate.

3 Keep communicating

Post regular updates on your progress and thank everyone for their donations. It'll help them feel more involved and may encourage last minute donations.

Claim Gift Aid

This is the simplest way to maximise your fundraising. We can claim an extra 25p for every £1 a taxpayer donates. Make sure your supporters tick the

Gift Aid declaration box on your sponsorship form or the correct box if donating online.

Double your money

Many employers will match the amount you raise for charity. Ask if your company can help double your fundraising.

6 Ask for help

Get support from friends, family, colleagues, neighbours or anyone else you know with whatever needs doing, such as publicity, planning and setting up the event, baking or contributing raffle prizes.

7 Know the law

Depending on your fundraising activity, there may be some things you need to do to stay safe and legal. For advice on street collections, raffles and lotteries, insurance and data protection contact us on community. fundraising@ndcs.org.uk.
